# WI 4-H Code of Conduct for Members and Participants

The opportunity to participate in 4-H programs is a privilege. Everyone who participates in any 4-H programs are expected to follow these standards. This Code of Conduct applies to all 4-H activities (i.e. in-person, social media, virtual meetings, etc.).

**Participate** - I will do my best to participate in 4-H programs as my abilities allow. I will do my best to meet new friends, try new things, and explore new opportunities and have fun!

**Create a Welcoming Environment for All -** I will help create a safe, inclusive space for learning, sharing and cooperating. I will welcome people from diverse backgrounds, cultures, and perspectives.

**Bring Your Best Self** - I will conduct myself in a manner that reflects honesty, integrity, awareness and self-control. I will accept responsibility for my decisions and actions. I will be open to new ideas, suggestions, and opinions. I will use appropriate language, exhibit good sportsmanship and have empathy for others.

**Follow the Rules** - I will obey federal, state and local laws. I will follow the policies, guidelines and procedures of the University of Wisconsin Division of Extension. I will not possess, offer to others, or use alcohol, illicit drugs, nicotine or any vaping products during any 4-H program. I will not attend 4-H activities under the influence of alcohol or illegal substances. Possession or use of a weapon or lookalike or other item that might cause bodily harm is not allowed unless it is authorized as part of the educational program.

**Honor Diversity** – Mine and Others'. I respect and uphold the rights and dignity of all persons who participate in 4-H programs. I recognize that all people have skills and talents to contribute.

**Create a Safe Environment** - I will keep myself and others safe from harm (verbal, mental, physical, or emotional). I will be kind, considerate and courteous of all persons and their property. I will not insult, harass, or bully others or engage in other hostile behaviors. I will not engage in romantic displays or sexual activities during 4-H activities.

**Be a Team Player -** I will work cooperatively with all individuals involved in 4-H activities. I will accept appropriate guidance from staff and volunteers. I will respect the integrity of the group and the group's decisions. I will be aware that my words and actions have an impact on others. Though I may not always agree with others, I will disagree respectfully and seek mutual understanding. An AA/EEO employer, Division of Extension provides equal opportunities in employment and programming, including Title VI, Title IX and ADA requirements.

Treat Animals Humanely - Treat animals humanely and provide appropriate animal care.

**Follow the Dress Code -** I will wear clothing that promotes safety and inclusion for all. I will wear clothing that is practical for the activity occurring. I will wear clothing that is free of promoting violence, obscenity, illegal activities, discrimination, or intimidation. When participating in 4-H, I recognize I am representing myself and the organization. Individual programs may have more specific requirements.

**Be a Positive Role Model** - I will act in a mature, responsible manner, recognizing I am a role model for others and am representing both myself and the Wisconsin 4-H Program. I will be responsible for my behavior, use positive and supportive language, and work to Make the Best, Better!

# The Menominee 4-H Youth Officers

### **Duties of Officers**

President – The president shall run the meetings.

Vice President – In the absence of the president, the vice-president shall preside and help plan meetings and programs.

Secretary – The secretary shall keep a record of all proceedings of the club.

**Treasurer** – The treasurer shall receive and take care of all money belonging to the club and shall pay it out upon order of the Menominee 4-H youth officer members and 4-H Youth Development Educator keeping an accurate record of all money received and paid.

**Historian** – The historian shall keep a record of photos and newspaper clipping to share at the end of the program year.

### Qualifications of Officers

1. Must be an active youth enrolled club member for at least year in the Menominee 4-H program

2. Must be 8 years old or in 3rd grade to 1-year passed high school

### **Election of Officers**

1. At the annual officer election meeting, nominations will be open of qualified club members following a final vote with majority rules.

2. The officers shall be elected by ballot if needed, at a regular meeting designated for the purpose of newly elected officers to run for one program year.

3. All Menominee 4-H club youth members are eligible to vote.

4. Ties for election of office are to be broken by current sitting officers of the Nicianak 4-H Club.

5. If an officer cannot fulfill their duties for any reason as an elected officer, the Menominee 4-H youth officers can nominate and appoint a qualified person within the Menominee 4-H program.

# The Menominee 4-H Adult Advisory Board

Adult Advisors – The Menominee 4-H adult advisors shall be under the direction of the Positive Youth Development Extension Educator working in partnership with youth club members.

**General Responsibilities** – Be present at officer meetings serving as an advisor for decision making. Attend as many events as possible supporting youth in the Nicianak 4-H Club promoting and engaging with young people.

### Other Responsibilities -

- Supervise at club meetings
- Participate in leader trainings, if requested
- Attend and assist in 4-H large scale events, such as the awards banquet, promotion events, and community service events
- Attend and actively participate in youth officer board meetings
- Review and be knowledgeable in by-laws and goals every year
- Attend the annual advisory board meeting providing helpful feedback for expanding access to club members
- Assist with completing Charter renewal and Annual Financial Report

# PURPOSE & GOALS OF THE NICIANAK 4-H CLUB

# HOW TO BECOME A YOUTH CLUB MEMBER

Section 1.01 of by-laws states:

A 4-H club member must be in 5-year-old Kindergarten and may continue in the 4-H Club through the next 4-H year following their graduation from high school not to extend beyond the age of 19 as of December 31 of the enrollment year.

Section 2.01 of by-laws states:

Open to any youth within grade parameter – regardless of that person's race, color, creed, religion, sex, national origin, disability, ancestry, sexual orientation, pregnancy, marital or parental status.

# STEPS TO ENROLL IN THE NICIANAK 4-H CLUB

1. Fill out an enrollment form each program year starting September 1<sup>st</sup> of each 4-H year

2. You only need to enroll 1x a year

3. You will still need to register for special projects and events when requested

4. You may also enroll using the online website: <u>https://wi.4honline.com/#/user/sign-in</u>

5. Each year, you may re-enroll and or add a new member

# HOW TO BECOME AN ADULT VOLUNTEER

### Volunteers help make 4-H possible!

To volunteer, you don't need to have previous experience working with youth. Must be 18 years or older. The most important qualifications are:

- A desire to work with young people to help them learn new things and gain life skills; and
- Wanting to provide youth with positive experiences in a safe and welcoming environment.

In 4-H there are many ways to volunteer. All volunteers work with youth and adult volunteers in offering a positive youth development experience for young people. Check out specific volunteer opportunities below:

- Activity/Event Volunteer Provide leadership/organization for an activity or event and/or participate as a committee member
- Adult Advisor/Chaperone Work with a team of adult advisors and PYD staff to ensure youth have a safe and positive educational experience.
- **Club Enrollment Coordinator -** Provide leadership for members and adult volunteers who are enrolling in the club or group organization
- Club Leader Provide leadership to the club or group organization
- **Committee Volunteer** Provide leadership for a committee and/or participate as a member of a committee, creating educational experiences for all youth engaged in the program
- **Project Leader** Provide leadership and organization to the project group who is learning about a specific topic.

# Spotlight on...Menominee 4-H Regalia Making

But together, youth and adults work to create the egalia pieces.



While making regalia, youth also discover techniques like beading, painting and designing. Over the course of the project, youth and their families participate in interviewing local regalia makers, cultural events, hands-on fabric selection and pattern cutting. Learning to sew is a great life skill that youth can use in other projects. The art of making regalia is a perfect example of mastery. Youth master sewing, craftsmanship, measuring, earning and online research to document what they've completed in their project guidebook. This project allows youth to explore cultural history and traditions. Each participant has individuality when it comes to their tribal affiliation, name and regalia style they choose. "Most participants are beginners, but some come with an understanding of how to make regalia all while learning together," says Sofie Teller, Extension Educator, Extension Menominee County/Nation.

At the end of the project, youth help plan a regalia revue. Families and elders speak at the review and wish the youth well and encourage them to continue to improve their sewing and regalia making skills.

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# Financial Policies in 4-H

### 4-H Clubs and Groups – Public Funds

All funds raised using the 4-H Name and Emblem are publicly accountable. They must be used to support:

- Educational programs
- Activities
- Workshops
- Supplies

Funds raised using the 4-H Name and Emblem become the property of 4-H. They are not the property of individuals who helped raise the funds. In addition, funds are not to be raised in the name of a particular individual (member or leader). No individuals may use them for personal financial gain.

### Funds may not be raised for:

- Pocket money
- Personal items/expenses
- Souvenirs

**Exception**: Funds may be used to provide scholarship and memorial funds for 4-H members and volunteers. Use a selection process with criteria approved by the 4-H Program Educator.

### B. Duties of the Club or Group Leadership

4-H Club or Group Leaders and Treasurer must maintain accurate financial records. Use these tools to keep accurate financial records:

- Receipt book
- Checkbook
- Check register
- Payment vouchers
- Bank statements

Follow procedures consistently throughout the year. Not following them can lead to financial issues. Club Leaders and Treasurers should work together to handle Club and Group finances carefully, responsibly, and accurately. This minimizes exposure to risk.

How a Leader Can Help:

- Leaders support and advise the 4-H Treasurer.
- Leaders know the financial issues that affect the 4-H Club or Group.
